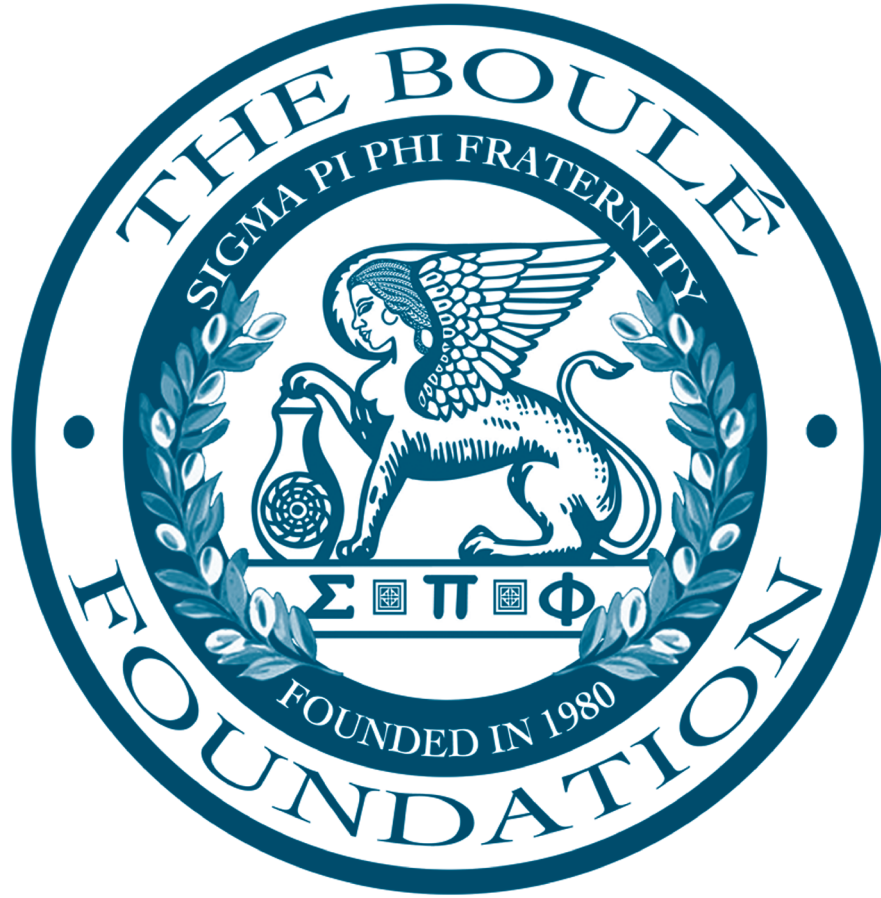

NEW BOULÉ FOUNDATION TRUSTEES ELECTED

The Boulé Foundation Board of Trustees, at its annual meeting in Chicago on June 1, elected to the board of trustees Archousa Jacquelyn C. Shropshire, Archon Kelvin Buncum of Kappa Boulé, Atlanta, and Immediate Past Grand Sire Archon Charles C. Teamer of Alpha Alpha Boulé, New Orleans.

Archousa Jacquelyn Calloway Shropshire has many firsts to her credit in her life as a career woman, philanthropic board member, fund-raiser, community-service volunteer and entrepreneur. Born in Kansas City, Missouri, she attended public schools. After earning her baccalaureate degree in business education and economics from Lincoln University in Jefferson City, she became the first African American employee in an administrative position with Trans World Airlines. She later taught in the Kansas City school system.

In 1961 she married Thomas Shropshire and moved to New York City, where she earned a master's in education from Hunter College and taught in the New York public schools. In 1968 she accompanied her husband to Lagos, Nigeria, during his tenure as corporate vice president of Philip Morris. There she helped organize the first American

Women's Club to aid and assist in all areas of community service, especially in teaching parenting skills to unwed mothers and placing abandoned children in safe and secure homes. She also founded and served as editor-in-chief of *Fancy That*, a newsletter for women.

The family moved from Nigeria to Milwaukee in 1972, where Archousa Shropshire began thirty years of service with the Milwaukee Urban League, initially as a volunteer, later accepting an appointment as executive director, and ultimately being elected to the board of directors. During that time she also gave support and guidance to other organizations serving youths and women and aiding community development. She organized the first African American debutante cotillion with Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., which presented more than \$300,000 in scholarships to deserving young African American women in the Milwaukee community; she was the first African American female corporate Wisconsin chairman for the United Negro College Fund, raising more than \$500,000. Archousa Shropshire is the owner of Momentum Unlimited, a firm specializing in management development, public relations, and special event planning.



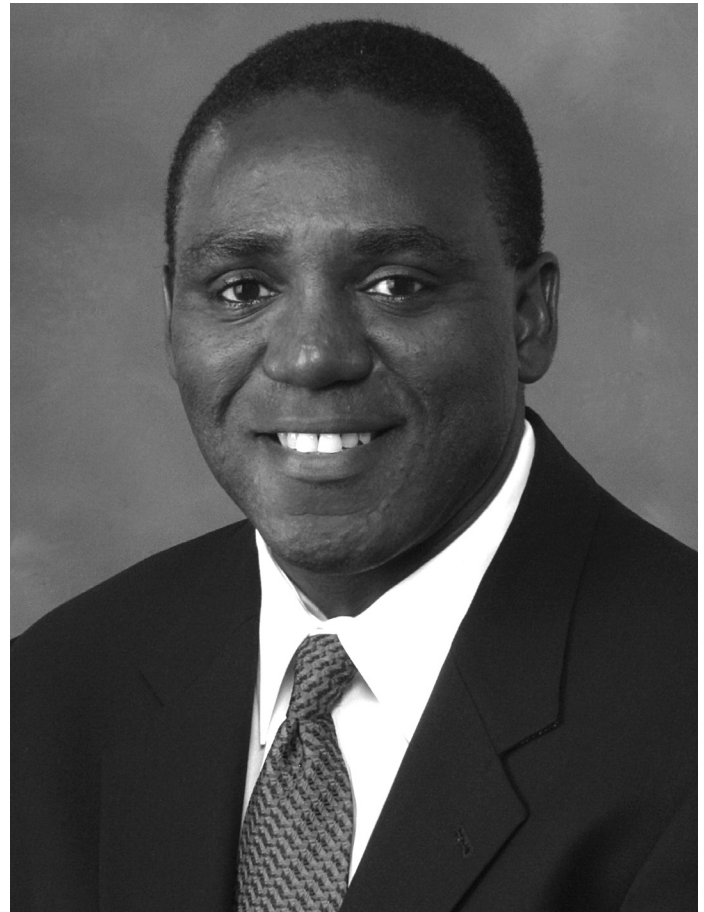

Her past and present board memberships include the Milwaukee Urban League; University of Wisconsin (Milwaukee); Women’s Business Initiative Corp. (YWCA); The Next Door Foundation; American Red Cross; National Endowment for the Arts Advisory Committee; Milwaukee Historical Society; Greater Milwaukee Convention and Visitors Bureau; African World Festival; Inner City Arts Council; The Curative Workshop of Milwaukee; and the Joint Center of Political Studies in Washington, D.C., among others. She was a founding board member of the Smith Performing Arts Center, Las Vegas, Nevada, and the organizer and board chairman of the Las Vegas–Clark County Urban League.

Archousa Shropshire is also an active life member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority (Golden Girl), The Links, Inc., and the NAACP; president of the Quarter Century Club, National Urban League; The Girl Friends, Inc.; and life member, National Council of Negro Women.

She has received numerous awards and citations for her untiring and expert leadership and service. In 2001 the General Assembly of the state of Tennessee passed a resolution naming the Jacquelyn C. Shropshire Family Literacy Center in Memphis at the Goodwill International School for Boys and Girls.

Her most recent awards and recognitions include Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation “A Woman of Excellence” (2005); Caucus of African Americans Trailblazer Award in recognition of leadership and dedica-

tion to the Las Vegas Community (2005); Alpha Kappa Alpha Outstanding Contributions to the Black Family Award (2006); Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity (The Boulé) Judge William “Turk” Thompson Legacy Award (2006); Las Vegas–Clark County Black History Visionary Award (2007); E-Vibe Phenomenal Woman Award (2007); Television Station KLAS (Channel 8) Portraits of Pride Recognition for Volunteer Service to the Las Vegas Community (2007)

Archousa Shropshire has a son, attorney Thomas B. Shropshire, Jr.; a daughter-in-law, Christina Shropshire; a daughter, Terilyn A. Shropshire, A.C.E; and two granddaughters, Bailey Elizabeth and Emily Kate.

A native of Johns Island, South Carolina, **Archon Kelvin L. Buncum** is vice president and general manager of the Pepsi Bottling Group of Atlanta/North Georgia Division. In this capacity, he oversees nine distribution centers to include one producing facility, in Atlanta, with a sizable employee population. His local team has the sole responsibility for the production, marketing, sales and distribution of Pepsi products in Middle and North Georgia.

Over the past twenty-five years, Archon Buncum has worked for the Digital Equipment Corp., AT&T Bell Laboratories, Northern Telecom and Joyner Communications. With these companies, he held leadership roles in the areas of product development, marketing, sales management, applications planning and general management. He is a graduate of North Carolina A&T State University and Harvard Business School.

Since moving to Atlanta with Pamela, his Archousa of twenty-two years, and their two boys, Kelvin has become involved in trade organizations that support his industry. He is the former chairman of the Georgia Beverage Association and a member of the board of directors for Safe America Foundation, the APEX Museum and the Warrick Dunn Foundation. He has also been a member of the Hughes-Spalding Children's Hospital Advisory Board and the Georgia Food Industry Association board of directors.

Being civic-minded, he has fostered a close partnership with several community-based organizations, most notably the Concerned Black Clergy of Atlanta. Together Pepsi and the Concerned Black Clergy of Atlanta offer annual scholarships in the amount of \$25,000 to deserving youths from the Atlanta area. Archon Buncum and his family are members of Cascade United Methodist Church, where he teaches Sunday school to high-school students.

Immediate Past Grand Sire Archon Charles C. Teamer, Sr., a distinguished business and civic leader, is currently chairman of Dryades Savings Bank in New Orleans and interim executive director of the Amistad Research Center. In 1994 Archon Teamer, a cofounder, was instrumental in the purchase and establishment of the bank. Since its inception, the bank has grown and expanded its base to serve the Greater New Orleans Metropolitan Area and the Mississippi Gulf Coast. Under Archon Teamer's leadership, it has become a major force in the local financial community.

Archon Teamer has worked to design a strategy for the economic growth and development of the community by serving as director of numerous boards including Entergy-New Orleans, the Alton Ochsner Medical Foundation, the World Trade Center and the Audubon Institute. He has also been chairman of numerous boards including the Urban League of Greater New Orleans, the Metropolitan Area Committee, Harrah's New Orleans Casino, the Greater New Orleans Foundation and the United Way. In 1983, Governor David Treen appointed him as the first African American on the Board of Commissioners of the Port of New Orleans.

Well known for his achievement in the area of higher education, Archon Teamer was recently named the First Citizen of Learning for his outstanding work as an educator and university administrator by the University of New Orleans. He has been the vice president of fiscal affairs at Dillard University and Clark Atlanta University. With his work in the financing of higher education recognized throughout the nation, he is currently a member of the board of supervisors for the University of Louisiana System, the board of administrators of Tulane University, the business and higher-education council for the University of New Orleans, and the boards of the Southern Education Foundation and the Institute for Church Administration.

On the national level, Archon Teamer has been a consultant to the U.S. Department of Education, the Board of Education of the United Methodist Church, the Ford Foundation and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. He has also served in a national capacity as a board member of the Common Fund National Association of Colleges and University Business Officers. He has also been president of the Southern Association of College and University Business Officers.

Archon Teamer has donated much of his time to working on behalf of others; his volunteer efforts and civic leadership have been recognized through his receipt of numerous honors and awards including the Alpha Pi Alpha Award of Merit, the Torch of Leadership Award from the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, the Alexis de Tocqueville Society Award from the United Way, and the Weiss Award from the National Conference of Christians and Jews. In addition, he has received the Silver Beaver Award for "distinguished service to scouting" from the New Orleans Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, and the Whitney Young Award for Service to Urban and Rural Scouting. He was selected one of the Ten Outstanding Citizens in New Orleans, one of The Top Volunteer Activists in New Orleans, and a Role Model by the Young Leadership Council. He is a life member of the NAACP and recipient of its Outstanding Black Achievement Award.

Archon Teamer was the twenty-seventh general president of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity. In addition, this Immediate Past Grand Sire Archon of Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity, Inc., is a 33rd Degree Prince Hall Mason and Shriner. He is a member of Mount Zion United Methodist Church and was previously treasurer of the Louisiana Annual Conference.

A native of Salisbury, North Carolina, Sire Archon Teamer was educated at Clark Atlanta University, the University of Nebraska and Tulane University. He was married for 47 years to Mary Dixon Teamer, now deceased, who was much loved by all who knew her. He has three children: Charles, Jr., Roderic, Sr., and Cheryl, and six grandchildren.
